Overview

Political Science 102 is a web-based introductory course in American government and politics. The course deals with all aspects of the American political system, including the fundamental principles of government, structure of government, political institutions, and the political attitudes and activities of individual citizens and groups.

- Program to compose written assignments (Microsoft Word, Corel WordPerfect, Open Office)

In addition to an Internet browser, students must be able to compose written assignments (using Microsoft Word or Corel WordPerfect) and submit them using the assignment tool in the WVU eCampus classroom. If using a Mac, save assignments in RTF format.

Technical problems can sometimes come up unexpectedly. Students should have a backup plan for Internet and e-mail access in case your home or work computer connection goes off line or crashes. Always keep a back-up copy of all assignments and e-mails in a safe place. Though they are rare, major system outages and failures do happen. **Remember that individual technical problems are not an acceptable excuse for late assignments.**

Throughout the semester, readings, announcements, notes of clarification, and grades will be placed in the WVU eCampus classroom. To access these, students will need to enter the electronic classroom regularly (at least three times each week). Detailed instructions are available at <https://ecampus.wvu.edu/>. Be certain to do a browser check-up so that you will be able to see and access all the features in the WVU eCampus classroom.

This class will use the WIMBA live classroom. Students must be able to access and use the WIMBA live classroom software. To get the most out of the WIMBA experience, a headset (microphone and headphones all in one) is recommended, but not required. Lectures will be every Monday from 6:00pm-7:15pm. More information about how to use WIMBA is available on the WIMBA Classroom Getting Ready Guide found in the “WIMBA Live Classroom” folder on the homepage of the 102 classroom.

Discussion:

Discussion boards are an essential part of this online course. They are designed to stimulate thought, distribute information, clarify concepts, share ideas, explore course materials in detail, and to examine the course concepts from a new or different perspective. Each Monday a discussion question will be posted on the discussion board. Students will have until Sunday at 11:59pm of that week to post a response to the question. Questions are worth a total of ten (10) points per week. There will be fifteen questions posted for a total of one hundred and fifty (150) points. **Any student who does not post a response to the discussion question by 11:59pm on Sunday will receive a zero for that week.** There are no make-ups on discussion questions without prior approval from the instructor.

Remember: Some of the topics have no right or wrong answer. It is fine to disagree. However, be respectful of your classmates' opinions. Expect different beliefs and perspectives. Your classmates may express ideas that are foreign to you because this class is diverse. If you disagree with someone, disagree with their ideas. Listen and learn from your fellow students!

Assignments:

Assignments are designed to allow students to demonstrate their knowledge of the material in written form. Assignments should be completed in essay format and are worth one hundred (100) points each.

Remember: All assignments are due by **9:00am Eastern Time** on the due date. No late assignments will be accepted after 9:00am. All assignments not turned in by 9:00am on the due date will be issued a zero. Any extension for a particular assignment must be arranged with the instructor prior to the assignment due date. Also, grade disputes must be brought to the instructor's attention no later than one (1) week after the grades are returned.

Notes:

1. Copying from the textbook or cutting and pasting sections from websites or other reference materials or presenting someone else's ideas as your own is plagiarism and will not be tolerated and will result in zero (0) points for that assignment. In addition, all work submitted must be original for this class.
2. This class will utilize the *Turn It In* originality software.
3. If the instructor is unable to open an assignment attachment, the assignment must be resubmitted within 48 hours or the assignment will be issued a zero.
4. Always check the uploaded attachment is correct. After the deadline passes, the content submitted will be used for grading.

Exams:

A midterm and a comprehensive final exam will be given. Respondus Lockdown Browser is required to take the exams. Instructions for downloading and using Respondus Lockdown Browser can be found in the "Getting Started" folder on the homepage of the 102 classroom. A practice exam will be available shortly after the start of the semester. Students should take the practice exam prior to the midterm exam to test their computer settings.

Remember: **Any student who does not take the midterm and or final exam during the allotted time will receive a zero for that exam.** Any arrangements concerning a particular exam must be made prior to the exam and approved by the instructor.

Class Attendance:

As stated above, this class will utilize WIMBA Live Classroom. Please review the WIMBA Classroom Getting Ready Guide found in the “WIMBA Live Classroom” folder on the homepage of the 102 classroom. Students should run the setup wizard prior to the first class to ensure all settings are correct. Class will be held every Monday at 6:00pm. Throughout the semester, roll will be taken ten (10) times for a total of five (5) points each time. Class attendance is worth fifty (50) points total.

Any student who is unable to attend Monday classes due to a time conflict should contact the instructor during the first week of class. Also, any student who is unable to attend a particular class should contact the instructor prior to that class. No student will lose attendance credit due to work or prior commitment. When a student is unable to attend a live class, the student must watch the class archive by the following Sunday at 11:59pm to receive attendance credit. In addition, the student must enter the archive for attendance credit. NO CREDIT will be given for downloading the class as an MP3 or MP4 file.
